THE MINISTER'S LETTER

To the Family of God at Radford Road Church,

The chill in my office tells me that we are definitely heading into the autumn season, and I guess, like many of you, I am stubbornly resisting turning the central heating on until at least the start of October! Looking out of the front window I can see the colour of the leaves turning on the horse chestnut tree at the front and I am reminded of God's beauty and goodness.

In the spring and summer the trees reflect every shade of green, but the browns and reds and golds are gone, the colours of the leaves are hidden by chlorophyll which absorbs the other wavelengths of light to photosynthesize, but in the winter as the



temperature drops and the hours of daylight recede, the chlorophyll is reabsorbed and the leaves begin to reflect every colour on the spectrum!

It seems to me that if we are not careful our lives can become like that, we can obscure the beauty of God's goodness by absorbing it rather than reflecting it. God's blessing becomes something we hoard rather than something to pass on. Sometimes, it is only as things start to decay, as we die to self, that we begin to most fully reflect God's beauty to the world around us. I pray, 'Oh help us Lord to reflect your beauty to the world around us, the many colours of your goodness.' In this season of reflection, as the leaves reflect every colour God sends, I might wish them to remain forever, but again that is not what is best for the earth. For 'while the earth remains, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night, shall not cease' (Genesis 8:22). It was the necessity of this that Jesus pointed to in his own life and ministry when he assured his disciples, 'Truly, truly, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies, it bears much fruit' (John 12:24).

This autumn then I don't fear the falling leaves, I admire the colours and rejoice in the season's beauty, I pray that my life would reflect this goodness of God's grace. I also look to Jesus' own words as the basis of my own confidence, that even the falling of the leaves is not the end of life, and that after winter comes spring. Then I look forward with a wry sense of amusement as I think of all the self-seeded horse chestnuts I'll be pulling up!

Their aim is to encourage the local community (Muslims and Christians) to talk together and explore ways of healing the hurt and bitterness that has developed following the atrocities of recent times in the Bosnia area. A priority is to train local people to be Facilitators and to run workshop activities in their local area. This has already happened in areas of Croatia and Serbia were Clive initially worked. Everyone was deeply moved by the work being undertaken.

After a piping hot fish and chip supper we all settled down to watch the second half of The Last Night of the Proms.

Everyone thoroughly enjoyed what has now become a tradition in the Radford Road calendar and we were all amazed to learn that £262.10 had been raised that evening for our Mission Project.

We are a quarter of the way to our Mission Project target!

Recently, Wednesday Lunch had a visit from Lyn of New Hope Counselling. She has sent us their prayer needs as requested. She writes......

We will shortly be taking on our 25th counsellor. We are becoming a large counselling team! Yet, we feel we are barely coping with demand. Our waiting list feels very long and clients referring to us this week have been told they face a 2-3 month wait following their assessment. Most of them do not have the option of private therapy because of cost. They also know that the NHS IAPT service currently has a 6 month waiting list and Mental Health Services, who deal with more serious mental health issues, have a two year wait for therapy. They are also not taking on new referrals unless they are considered a danger to others. CAMHS, the mental health service for children, has a 3 year waiting list!

As you can see by the above, so many are suffering and not getting the help they need. We feel that what we do is sometimes a drop in the oceon but it is still making a difference and many of our clients with testify to this. Praise God that we are able to do what we do! He has been with us mightily as we have grown over the years.
