

THE MINISTER'S LETTER

To the Family of God at Radford Road Church,

There is much important work that continues through the life of our Church at this time, there is a concert of the Lillington Ladies' choir which took place on Tuesday 28th June there's the Children's Activity Mornings on the 1st and 2nd August (from 9:30am), the Wednesday Worship that continues across the summer, the work of the Night Shelter, and we will present our Mission Fund gift to the Mission Aviation Fellowship at our Sunday service on the 13th August. Though I hope that in amongst all of this and other activities we will also find time to enjoy a summer break.

Sometimes we need to rest and refocus our energies, to think what it is that God is showing us to do.

This week I have been reading a section in Matthew's gospel from chapters 9 and 10 that really centres on the source of Christian mission. It starts in Matthew 9:35-36 with Jesus seeing crowds of people and we're told that his heart went out to them because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. A good place to start when thinking about the true source of our mission is the heart of God for our world, the compassion the Jesus felt for people. There is a modern worship song that calls on God to 'break my heart for what breaks yours'.

Christian mission starts with the heart of God and then flows into human hearts.

It is easy to feel overwhelmed when we open up our hearts to the compassion that Jesus has for the crowds, but the good news is that Jesus recognised that same sense of overwhelming need too. The very next thing he said to his disciples is 'The harvest is huge, but there are hardly any workers'. In other words the task is overwhelming, the resources are limited, and the statistics are troubling. But statistics are not ultimate. Our God is ultimate. So we need to go again and again to God in prayer, 'to ask the Lord of the harvest to send out workers into his fields'. So please keep praying for Radford Road Church!

Christian mission relies upon the prayers of Jesus' disciples.

Our third source of Christian mission is the authority that Jesus gives his disciples and the fellowship of the church (Matthew 10:1-4). It is an authority over unclean spirits and over every sickness, Matthew Henry, in his commentary on the Bible, notes that 'the design of the Gospel was to *conquer* the devil and to *cure* the world'. It is not an authority to fill us with airs and graces, a sense of superiority, but to bring healing (and often that comes through acknowledging our own sin and yet holding on to God's mercy).

Christian mission is based on the authority Jesus gives.

It is here in his Gospel that Matthew names the twelve disciples, and that indicates another fourth source of our mission is the fellowship of the church. I hope and pray that in fellowship we are looking to give to others as much as to receive, to listen and to encourage people, to support things others lead as much as our own passions, for mission isn't something we do alone. When we come to faith we are joined to the church, and to a mission God gave to his church.

Christian mission is a shared enterprise.

So let's all choose to play our part in it, and in doing so may we all know God's blessing.



Martin Luther King is best known as a civil rights advocate. In 1964 he received the Nobel Peace Prize for combating racial inequality through non-violent resistance. His 'I have a Dream' speech came to be regarded as one of the finest speeches in the history of American oratory and helped put civil rights at the top of the agenda of reformers in the United States and facilitated the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

As a Christian minister, King's main influence was Jesus Christ and the Christian gospels, which he would almost always quote in his

religious meetings, speeches at church, and in public discourses. King's faith was strongly based in Jesus' commandment of loving your neighbour as yourself, loving God above all, and loving your enemies, praying for them and blessing them. His non-violent thought was also based in the injunction to turn the other cheek in the Sermon on the Mount, and Jesus' teaching of putting the sword back into its place (Matthew 26:52). In his famous 'Letter from Birmingham Jail' (Birmingham, Alabama, USA), King urged action consistent with what he describes as Jesus' "extremist" love, and also quoted numerous other Christian pacifist authors, which was very usual for him. In another sermon, he stated:

'Before I was a civil rights leader, I was a preacher of the Gospel. This was my first calling and it still remains my greatest commitment. You know, actually all that I do in civil rights I do because I consider it a part of my ministry. I have no other ambitions in life but to achieve excellence in the Christian ministry. I don't plan to run for any political office. I don't plan to do anything but remain a preacher. And what I'm doing in this struggle, along with many others, grows out of my feeling that the preacher must be concerned about the whole man'.

In his speech "I've Been to the Mountaintop", he stated that he just wanted to do God's will.

Martin Luther King was assassinated on April 4th 1968 but in his short lifetime (39 years), his strong Christian principles changed people's attitudes and thinking and made the world a better place.

Most of all we need you and your friends at the Fair so please put the date in your diaries.


WHEN THE VICAR WON WIMBLEDON

July 3rd sees the start of Wimbledon. No doubt many of us will be glued to our televisions watching the tennis stars battling for the prestigious crown. But how did it all begin?

“Lawn Tennis,” wrote J.B. Priestley, “is a name with the mildest associations. It suggests a companion pastime to croquet, a late-Victorian thing, bright with petticoats and delicately clouded with curates.”

So it seemed with the development of Wimbledon’s All England Lawn Tennis Club from its beginnings in 1869 as a Croquet Club, at which “Gentlemen are requested not to play in their shirt sleeves when ladies are present.”

However, with the addition of tennis courts to the grounds, the new game gained ascendancy, and the first Wimbledon Tennis Championships took place in 1877. It was at the third tournament of 1879 that the Revd. J.T. Hartley, vicar of Burneston in Yorkshire, won the All-Comers Gentlemen’s Singles out of an entry of 45 competitors at Wimbledon, and repeated the feat the following year. On the middle Sunday of the tournament, he was obliged to dash back to Yorkshire to deliver his church sermon before returning once again to complete his triumph at the All-England Club.

THE PRAYING HANDS

Albrecht Durer was born in the fifteenth century, near Nuremberg. He was one of eighteen children. Albrecht's father, a goldsmith by profession, worked long hours and took any other paying chore he could find in his neighbourhood in order merely to keep food on the table for his large family.

Two of the children, Albrecht and Albert were talented artists they both dreamt of pursuing their talent further, but they knew that their father would never be able to afford to send either of them to Nuremberg to study at the Academy. So the two boys worked out a plan. One would work in the nearby mines and support his brother with his earnings whilst the other would attend the academy. Then when that brother had finished his studies in four years they would swap. Albrecht won the toss of the coin and attended the academy whilst Albert went down into the mines and supported his brother during his studies with his earnings. Albert worked as a miner for the next four years and financed his brother, whose work at the academy was almost an immediate success. Albrecht's etchings, woodcuts, and his oils were often far better than those of most of his professors, and by the time he graduated, he was beginning to earn considerable fees for his commissioned works.

After four years the young artist returned to his village, Albrecht was ready to pay for his brother's time at the academy. The Durer family held a festive dinner to celebrate Albrecht's return. After the meal, Albrecht rose to drink a toast to his beloved brother thanking him for his support for the years of sacrifice that had enabled him to fulfil his ambition. His closing words were, "And now, Albert, blessed brother of mine, now it is your turn. Now you can go to Nuremberg to pursue your dream, and I will take care of you."

Albert rose, and holding his hands close to his right cheek, he said, "No, brother. I cannot go to Nuremberg. It is too late for me. Look what four years in the mines have done to my hands! No, brother ... for me it is too late." The bones in every finger had been smashed at least once, and were now suffering from arthritis, the thumbs were bent and twisted, such that it was difficult even to hold the glass toasting his brother, much less a brush.

Albrecht paid homage to his brother for all he had sacrificed and painstakingly sketched his brother's hands with palms together and thin fingers stretched skyward simply calling the drawing "Hands". If you look at the detail you will notice the crooked thumb and the gnarled hands that could not close due to the abuse the mines had wrought.

The world renamed his tribute of love, "The Praying Hands".

AWARD OF THE LAMBETH CROSS

Professor Peter Howdle, a former Vice-President of the Methodist Conference (2002-2003) and Emeritus Professor of Clinical Medicine at the University of Leeds, has been awarded the Lambeth Cross for Ecumenism by the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Most Revd Justin Welby. Through his efforts the relationship between the two groups has shown significant improvement over the years and he is now developing proposals for the interchangeability of ministry between the two traditions through the Joint Faith and Order Ministry and Oversight Group.
